REMEMBER THESE STEPS TO PROTECT YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE:

- 1. Verify the location of your polling place by calling your local election office.
- 2. Take identification to the polls in case you need it, preferably a government-issued photo ID or a utility bill or pay stub with your name and current street address.
- 3. Ask for help from poll workers if vou have questions or need assistance.
- 4. Stay in line if the polls close while you are waiting—you are entitled to vote.
- 5. If you are offered a provisional ballot because of eligibility questions, ask if you can cast a regular ballot with additional ID or by going to a different polling place. If no alternative is available or practical, cast a provisional ballot.
- 6. If you have a voting rights problem, speak with the chief election official or a voting rights volunteer.
